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FACE COVERING COVID-19



In England, you must by law wear a face covering in the following settings:

Public Transport - Transport operators can deny service or direct someone to wear a face covering. If necessary, the police and Transport for London authorised officers can issue fines of £100 (halving to £50 if paid within 14 days).

Using disposable respirators

Pre-use checks

- You should be clean-shaven around the face seal to achieve an effective fit when using disposable respirators. Beards and stubble will stop the disposable respirator sealing to your face and protecting you properly
- Make sure it is the right disposable respirator for your work and for you have you passed a face fit test in this disposable respirator?
- Make sure the disposable respirator is clean and undamaged before you use it
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for checking the disposable respirator and putting it on
- Check the fit every time you put on the disposable respirator to ensure there are no leaks

Putting the disposable respirator on and checking it fits



1 Cup the disposable respirator in one hand, with the straps hanging out of the way.



2 Hold the disposable respirator in place on your face.



3 Pull the bottom strap over your head, to the back of your neck.




4 Pull the top strap over your head to sit above your ears.



5 Check the straps are not twisted. If you need to tighten the straps, pull both ends at the same time, bottom first, then top.



6 If there is a nose clip, press this firmly to the shape of your nose.



7 Before entering the workplace, a user seal check should be carried out. This is done by placing your hands over the filter material and breathing in. The mask should suck down onto your face when you breathe in sharply. You should hold your breath for ten seconds and the disposable respirator should not loosen. If it does, you should readjust and repeat.

Check your disposable respirator before you put it on.

Then do a pre-use seal check or fit check - for a proper seal each time: Clean shaven? Edges tight?

Chin snug? Nose clip shaped? Straps in place?

This poster illustrates a typical disposable respirator, there are many other types available. Follow the manufacturer's instructions on putting your type of disposable respirator on and checking it fits.

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Toolbox Talk No. 71 ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES FOR CARPENTERS

- Construction timber comes in a large variety of forms, with very differing environmental impacts. Natural timber
 is very sustainable (it can easily be re-used and recycled) but, often not very durable (so we treat it with
 preservatives) or stable (we bond it with formaldehyde and isocyanate glues to make sheet and laminate
 materials).
- Chemicals and glues add dramatically to the environmental impact of such products. While they do not prevent re-use, they can make recycling more difficult as the wood is not 'clean'.
- Knowing where your timber comes from helps you to understand its environmental impact. Transport is a major
 cost and user of resources, so where you source your timber from is an important consideration.
- The Forestry Stewardship Council (FSC) scheme certifies that timber (both softwood and hardwood) comes from sustainable forests and not from the depletion of tropical rainforests.

Things you can do

We are aiming for the best practical environmental option – a balance between getting the job done well and considering the environmental impact.

You should:

- Know about the types and sources of timber.
- Know about hazardous waste and if your site is a registered producer.
- Use your materials and keep off-cuts for re-use.
- Use mechanical fixings where possible and use fewer composite boards, where we can.
- Segregate your waste, where the facilities exist.
- Pack skips well a skip is up to 70% air.
- Aim to recycle and reduce packaging waste at the end of a job, up to 35% of waste is packaging.
- Make sure pallets are sent back to the manufacturer, or back to the RCL yard.
- Use FSC timber, we are aiming to use 95% FSC timber in 2010
- Be aware that insulation reduces the energy needed to warm and cool buildings, and so has a direct impact
 on global warming. Insulation delivered to site should never be thrown away.
- WEEE Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment Regulations affect all forms of electrical equipment, from
 mobile phones to battery power tools. WEEE is classified as hazardous waste and needs to be deconstructed
 before disposal and therefore cannot be put into a mixed waste skip (or bin at home).
- Batteries Directive on the use and disposal of batteries. Batteries are also now classified as hazardous waste (because of the heavy metal content) and therefore cannot be put into a mixed waste skip.



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Toolbox Talk No. 3 BENEFITS OF SAFETY

BE SAFE BE SURE

- For years the construction industry has had a poor safety record with far too many accidents and too much ill health
- · Too many accidents are caused by people knowingly working or behaving in an unsafe manner
- With care, most accidents are totally and easily preventable
- When working, be aware of the safety of others as well as yourself. You have a legal duty to do so

WHAT YOU MUST DO:

- Comply with safety training and instruction, and with site safety rules; site induction should inform you
 of the hazards
- Avoid the temptation to cut corners to get the job done more quickly, there could be a high price to pay
- Be aware of how the job you are doing could affect other people around you
- Stay away from work if you know that you are not fit through illness, drink, drugs or for any other reason
- Ask your supervisor if you have any doubts on safety issues
- Report to your supervisor anyone who you see working or behaving in an unsafe manner, especially horseplay

THE COST OF ACCIDENTS

- A poor safety record could result in your company being fined and suffering increased insurance premiums
- It may reduce the company's chances of winning further contracts
- Money lost in these ways cannot be used elsewhere, the company could be forced out of business
- Employees and supervisors who demonstrate or tolerate poor safety practice may find themselves out of work
- The personal cost of knowing that you have caused a serious accident, or worse, could last a lifetime

THE BENEFITS OF SAFETY

- Fewer accidents resulting in less pain and suffering
- Individuals have less time off with possible loss of income
- Less disruption to the job as a whole with less inconvenience for individuals and their companies
- Fewer accidents investigations, fines and insurance premium increases; more money available for other things
- Higher employee morale and a more contented workforce
